DID YOU KNOW!

On September 23rd, 1962, **Mr. O.C. Stevens**, the father of **John Stevens**, suggested for the first time of having a Gourd Show at the Mt. Gilead Fair Grounds in autumn of 1963 in connection with the Gourd Society of America's annual meeting.

The Ohio Gourd Society, Inc., Beta Chapter of The Gourd Society of America, Inc., known as The American Gourd Society, Inc., had its first "Ohio Gourd Show"

October of 1963.

By 1967 The Ohio Gourd Show had approximately 5000 people in attendance. There were only two chapters at that time.

Alpha Chapter - S. Carolina Gourd Society

Beta Chapter - Ohio Gourd Society

HISTORY OF GOURDS

IN THE "GOOD OLD DAYS"

Long before the first Europeans arrived in the Americas, gourds had been cultivated by the Indians. Gourds grew in various sizes, shapes and colors and the early settlers soon learned to use these plants in a variety of ways.

The dipper gourd was useful for scooping water from a barrel or a spring. They were also used as ladles and measures. Other large gourds were dried and hollowed out to make thin but tough bowls and cups.

A round short handled gourd with a small hole cut near the top, was hung on the wall to store precious seed until spring planting time. Seed-gourds served as decorations when lined up along the kitchen wall or near the fireplace to keep their contents extra dry.

From the "Bottle Gourd" fine flasks were made by cutting off the hollow neck two or three inches above the swelling. A piece of corncob was used as a stopper. Bottle gourds were used as flower vases since glass was very expensive and difficult to obtain.

The pith of a dishrag gourd and a little sand scrubbed clean the settlers iron cook pots. Small egg gourds were the right size and shape for nest eggs and were often used for darning socks, or made into dolls heads.

As gourds dried, the seeds became loose and could be shaken free of the entire pith. Gourd rattles with stick handles were used by many Indian tribes. A large egg gourd mounted on a short wooden handle was the early American play rattle.

Fresh gourds were gathered in a basket and must have added a bright and different look to any kitchen, fireplace, or table in pioneer and colonial homes.

Small bright colored or warty gourds served then as now as decorative charmstrings - dried and polished with oil or beeswax and hung from the mantle or door frame.
